

Excellent book that introduces several theories as to how the Americas were first populated. Gives the reader a basic introduction to many excavation sites and scientific and archeological theories. Colorful illustrations, photographs, and maps to help clarify theories regarding migration and glacial movement as well as give the reader visual representations of ancient artifacts, etc. Excellent tool to

help show students how scholars can come up with theories and supporting evidence and yet still not be able to reach solid conclusions. The simple language and concise nature of the book is also beneficial to someone who is only mildly interested in the topic or who has never dealt with the Bering Land Bridge or similar theories. Very well done.

We are using this as our first book in our home school American history study. It raises more questions than it answers, which is how we like to learn history. The book discusses where the first Americans came from (both in North and South America), and a few different finds and locations are examined. The Bering Land Bridge theory is examined, as are the Clovis and pre-Clovis people. One chapter discusses genetics, linguistics, and skull structure. While the topics are pretty complex, the text is clear enough for my nine-year-old to read on his own without problems. Overall, we are very pleased with this book; I've made out a study guide for each chapter so that this serves as a textbook.
