

With the sense of wonder and relish for life common to young people, this book teaches the water cycle better than any other explanation that could be offered. This is a masterful portrayal of change through seasons of discovery, experienced through the eyes, hands, and breaths of children.

This is a wonderful book, in which the poetic verse keeps you turning the page as the forms of water change from puddles, to sleet, to fog, to rain, and so on. This is a great nonfiction application to learning about the many forms of water. Chin's illustrations fill the pages, and are seen through the eyes of a child. I believe his medium is watercolor, and just breathtakingly lovely to linger over.

My kids and I absolutely adore this book. While it's about the water cycle and explores the concept of transformation in so many ways I never even considered, it's about more than that. Reading this book is a great starting point to talking about how concepts and things change over time and the author helps us jump start that with even discussing apples and the way even something as solid as an apple can transform from an apple to apple cider. And ofcourse no picture book is complete without amazing pictures and the pictures in here are exceptional, the illustrator includes small details like a snake that finds his way through the children's world, and other small details that keep the reading fresh and new each and every time we've read it, and considering we've read this book

about 50 times by now, that is a very very good thing!

The idea and story are wonderful and I absolutely love the illustrations. However the apple trees getting ripe in spring and drinking fresh cider in the summer are really frustrating when trying to teach a child about the natural cycles of the earth. We live in New England and apples are in the fall. But maybe there is a place on earth where apple season starts in spring?? If the story used an example of fruit or veggie that we could relate to, I would give this 5 stars. As it is, I really don't think I can read this to my kid without confusing her.

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
